Good and outstanding Secondary schools

OfSTED inspections - summary

Secondaries

- Lower % of schools judged good or o/s under the new framework compared to the old
- Same for Barnet as other LAs
- Overall now outside top 10% in top 16%
- Under the new framework in top 20%

Primaries

- Doing significantly worse than other LAs under the new framework – 14th overall but 53rd under the new framework
- External reviews





Pupil absence – national and local update

Director's meeting with Secondary headteachers – 1 May 2014

Attendance 2012/13 – national headlines - 1

- Persistent absence declined further
- Largest falls seen in secondary schools
- Lower levels of PA in primary than secondary
- Overall absence increased slightly but trend still downwards (exceptionally low illness in 2011/12)
- Percentage of unauthorised absence stable over past 5 years
- Overall absence rate for six half terms higher than five –
 more unauthorised absence and family holidays

Attendance 2012/13 – national headlines - 2

- Illness most common reason for absence, followed by family holidays
- FSM pupils have more absence little change over last five years and high levels of persistent absence
- Absence levels (including PA) higher for SEN pupils than national average
- Higher absence in deprived areas



Absence in Barnet - secondary

- Good 0.7% below national average absence rate of 94.2%
- But 0.1% above London average (5 half terms) better than primary but 6th highest absence in outer London
- Authorised absence levels 0.3% above national average, 0.4% above London average
- Clear link between lower levels of authorisation and lower overall levels of absence
- Persistent absence 1.1% below national average and 0.1% below London

(Data does not include PRUs)

Action to improve attendance

- LA action plan focussing on improving primary attendance, including development of planning templates, supporting website, attendance conference
- All schools (primary and secondary) encouraged to:
 - review data (groups issue: FSM, SEN, White British)
 - develop action plan and attendance interventions
 - consider use of pupil premium funding to overcome barriers to attendance
 - review policy and practice, particularly in respect of authorisation of absence





School places and admissions – update

Secondary admissions update

- The school admissions team have received 6757 on-time applications for a secondary transfer place
- 3476 were received from Barnet residents and 3281 from our of borough residents.
- This is an increase from last years total of 6510
- There are no unplaced children
- 90% of applicants received an offer from one of their first three school preferences.
- 97% of applicants applied online.

Let's talk shop

Aim:

- To capture existing and future retail opportunities arising from expansion of retail through regeneration
- To ensure Barnet young people are able to take advantage, with quality progression routes into successful careers in retail and supporting industries



Let's talk shop

How

- (i) Creating a buzz about retail among young people
 - Promote the wide range of opportunities in retail and associated support industries
 - Equip young people with skills retail employers say they want, offer hands on experience of working in the retail sector via local employers and Retail Skills Academy/Barnet and Southgate College
- (ii) Clear local pathway for Barnet young people -
 - Working with Middlesex University to develop a part time degree programme in retail
 - Training providers provide flexible retail career pathway combining earning and learning, acquiring skills whilst employed
- (iii) One stop shop for Brent Cross
- (iv) Connect unemployed LBB residents into retail work.





School Improvement review

Vision and aims?

Draft

- 'We want Barnet to be one of the best areas in the country for high quality education delivered and led by autonomous schools working together for the common good.'
- 'We aim to be, and remain, in the top 10 per cent of local authority areas in England on all the key performance measures and to move into the top 5% in relation to the percentage of pupils in good or outstanding schools by 2018'.



Performance issues

Still looking good overall, but:

- Good and outstanding schools:
 - 90% overall top 10% of LAs, top 16% for secondary
 - but 71% under the new framework close to England average
- Primary Writing
- Achievement of FSM pupils and FSM gap (especially at Primary)
- Achievement of Looked After Children (esp. at Secondary)
- Attendance (especially Primary but Secondary ranks low for London)
- Vocational education

System issues

- The vast majority of school improvement resources and expertise now controlled and managed by schools; 95% of the education budget is with schools
- A wide range of providers and governance models

Academies:

- 16 out of 22 **secondary** schools + 2 secondary Free Schools
- 6 Primary Academies, 3 Primary Free Schools, 2 more in 2014, new primary provision in existing Secondary Academies by 2016 (15% of Primaries)
- Interest in other primaries likely to increase to 30/40% of primaries within 2 to 3 years



System issues - 2

- LA small residual team of Learning Network Inspectors, who, with limited capacity, are trying:
 - to maintain links with all schools
 - while providing more intensive support to the significant number of schools causing concern
- National trend towards new delivery models for education services and an increasing emphasis on:
 - developing the system leadership role of schools, in particular headteachers of good and outstanding schools.
 - school-to-school support.



School Improvement strategy

- To be reviewed this term SSPB to develop thinking
- To include a **mapping** out of the **range of local resource** available teaching schools, NLEs, LLEs, BPSI, school improvement clusters etc.
- To develop a school improvement strategy that:
 - sets out proposed arrangements for monitoring, support and challenge, including the approach to schools causing concern
 - engages system leaders, (such as National and Local Leaders of Education, Teaching Schools, etc.) to support and challenge those in need and actively promote sector led improvement.
 - involves **full consultation** with schools and agreement on the **priorities** for school improvement.
