# **Schools Budget**

The Schools Forum agreed the draft schools budget for 2008-11 at the last meeting.

Since then the pupil numbers have been revised upward making a larger Dedicated Schools Grant. Additional information has also been received from the Learning & Skills Council and the total schools budget has increased by nearly £850,000.

We are still awaiting confirmation of our final DSG from the DCSF. We are expecting small negative and positive adjustments to our pupil numbers which may balance each other out. The final DSG and proposals for any subsequent adjustments will be brought to the next meeting of the Schools Forum.

Virtually all of the increase in the DSG has been added to the Individual Schools Budget or the Schools Specific Contingency. The breakdown of the contingency is now as follows:

There have been some corrections in the budgets of the LA retained part of the school's budget but these are mainly transfers between headings as shown on the report overleaf.

In February, we were forecasting that the Central Expenditure Limit (CEL) would be breached because the increase in the Schools Budget was 4.5% but the increase in the ISB & PVI budget was only 4.35%. Members accepted this on the assurance that any increase in government funding would be used to improve the CEL.

Our submission to the DCSF (Section 52) still shows that the CEL is breached but the gap has been narrowed. The Schools Budget would need to increase by £242,000 with all of it directed to the ISB and Under 5s to avoid the CEL being breached completely this year. The CEL in subsequent years is not expected to be breached.

### 1.1 Standards Fund - School Lunch Grant

## 1.1.1 Purpose

The new School Lunch Grant will be available for a period of three years from 1 April 2008 – 31 March 2011. It replaces the Targeted School Meals Grant (5A) and the School Meals Grant (5B) and has new and different rules governing its use.

The purpose of the School Lunch Grant is to increase school lunch take-up by keeping down the price of a school lunch. The conditions of the grant require authorities and schools to use the funding to help meet the direct costs of a school lunch. The ring-fenced grant can only be spent in four ways:

- Contribute towards the costs of ingredients for school lunches
- Contribute towards the labour costs of catering staff.
- Pay for the purchase of small pieces of kitchen equipment e.g. microwave ovens, steamers etc
- Pay for nutritional analysis software required to assess whether a menu meets the nutrient based school lunch standards and the expertise to operate the software.

Local authorities and schools cannot use the funding to pay for central teams, training of catering staff or promoting healthy eating to parents and pupils.

### 1.1.2 Allocation

The total funding for London Borough of Barnet in the first year is £485,741. The local authority is not required to devolve all of the funding to schools however, it should be allocated on a fair and equitable basis to all those that provide school lunches whether it is the local authority through its own service or a school who is providing its own lunches or using a contractor. Schools who do not provide lunches are not entitled to funding.

It is proposed that £160,000 is held centrally:

- £130,000 for the purchase of equipment. This would be held centrally and all schools would be invited to bid for money by putting forward a suitable business case.
- £30,000 to fund a centrally based facility for nutritionally analysing menus and recipes. All schools would be able to access this service free of charge.

£325,741 would be distributed to schools on a formula basis. Two alternative methods of allocation are shown overleaf. Whilst every school providing lunches would be allocated funding, it is proposed that the grant for those using the LBB Catering Service would be held centrally and used for food and labour costs of those schools. Schools not buying into the LBB service would receive the cash amount of the grant to use on the priorities above – either by themselves or their contractor.

Out of a number of options considered for distributing the funding to schools the following two options were considered to be the most fair and equitable.

**Option A** – All schools to receive £7.14 per pupil (all ages) on roll in January 2008. This option may be a little too simplistic and gives small schools too little funding.

**Option B** - A lump sum of £1000 for primary and secondary schools, £2000 for special schools and £500 for Pupil Referral Units plus £4.99 per pupil in Reception to Y13. Nursery schools and classes would not receive an allocation as these children are mostly part-time. This option targets funds more accurately at different types of school.

# 1.2 Learning Support Units

Following the last Schools Forum funding for secondary learning support units was discussed by the Barnet Behaviour Partnership (Secondary Headteachers). They decided to propose the following to the Schools Forum:

- 2008/9 Existing secondaries to receive the same funding as 2007/8
  2009/10 Existing secondaries to receive half the funding of 2008/9
- 2010/11 No funding for LSUs for existing secondaries

A working group will be set up to consider the needs of all schools for learning support and recommend to the Schools Forum how the money released in this funding cycle might be targeted.

In the longer term the Schools Forum will need to consider the future of this funding element of the funding formula for 20011-2014.
