Prevalence in Barnet / nationally	 In 2012 3450 children were adopted from care, just 70 of those were babies. (Figures from BAAF) In 2012 11 children were adopted in Barnet. This year it is likely to be 19 children.
How might this group be vulnerable?	 Using the attachment model, adopted children have broken attachments. This means that they are likely to have insecure attachments for the rest of their lives. Many adopted children are born addicted to substances. In 2012 the average age at adoption was three years and eight months of these children 72% were placed for adoption due to abuse or neglect, 12% due to family dysfunction, 6% because the birth family was in acute stress. That means that ninety percent of our adopted children have experienced less than optimal and probably very stressful early experiences. (Figures from BAAF) Kate Cairns (2012) indicates that adopted children have (on average experienced at least 10 such instances.
What is the impact / consequence of that vulnerability?	 Selwyn, Quinton and Sturgess (2002) – 130 children that were due to be adopted of these 95% had at least one special need and more than half of the children having four special needs. These included; developmental delay, behavior problems, attachment difficulties, poor concentration, hyper activity, enuresis, encopresis and physical disabilities. Rushton and Dance (2006) found that children adopted from care in the U.K were likely to have some behavioural difficulties even six years after placement. They are often over represented in mental health settings. They can be more difficult to parent and are more likely to be excluded from school. They can have difficulty in

	 relationships and struggle to cope with change and transition. Research estimates adoptions breakdown is between 11 -23%.
